AMBROSE AKINMUSIRE is on a quest for new paradigms, weaving inspiration from various genres, arts, and experiences into bold, new, and unflinching yet graceful forms. Pianist-composer KRIS DAVIS is the Associate Director of Creative Development at Berklee for the Institute of Jazz and Gender Justice. She runs her own contemporary jazz and improvisation label, and has been voted both Rising Star Artist and Rising Star Pianist in *Downbeat*. Drummer and music educator NASHEET WAITS is a New York native and son of legendary percussionist Frederick Waits. Amir ElSaffar presents the Chicago premiere of AHWAAL, a program mixing different musical worlds and blurring intercultural borders. Ahwaal is an important concept in Sufism, describing the states of consciousness (including joy, fear, ecstasy, intoxication, and intimacy) that define spiritual progression toward the divine, and transcendence of the ego-self. The states are said to arise and vanish, as flashes of lightning. One of the most sought-after jazz double bassists in Poland, KSAWERY WÓJCIŃSKI activates his gift of lightness, easiness, and musical erudition to switch between guises and stylistics — from jazz in its more accessible form, through avant-garde, to Polish folk music. Multi-instrumentalist, composer, and producer WACŁAW ZIMPEL is inspired by electronics, minimalism, and roots music from across the world, in addition to jazz. He applies endless possibilities of electronics and loops to his oeuvre to create a whole new musical language. The LUTOSŁAWSKI QUARTET, whose name honors the great composer of the 20th century, is one of the leading string quartets in Poland. When Jazz in the Alley closed after nearly 30 years, Alley DJs and, later, members of the now inactive "Jazz Junction," kept its spirit alive by spinning jazz records at neighborhood establishments. Other iterations of the original concept, most notably Universal Jazz Alley, continue today. Join some of the original Alley DJs, including the first women DJs, to discuss the significance of these much-celebrated convenings. PROJECT TOOL is a dance and movement performance choreographed to enable the dancers to explore the relationship between mind, body, and tool — in part through the process of building their own dance floor as part of the performance. As the dancers build, they collaborate with tools as partners to the body. The actual, real-time making of the floor through sawing, hammering, sanding, and nailing has the effect of unearthing an improvisational aural and visual landscape in which tasks, tools, and body all work together. RICHARD D. JOHNSON has cultivated a rich jazz resume, including studies with legendary musicians at esteemed institutions, and performances with some of the field's best. Johnson has also offered opportunities to others. He started the Reach Afar program, to educate young people about elements of jazz in hiphop. As a representative of the U.S. through the State Department, he was named Musical Ambassador — completing six state department tours and performing in more than 76 countries. 
